The Power of Trinity

I read an article recently that the United Kingdom has appointed a Minister of Loneliness to confront what Prime Minister Theresa May calls a "sad reality of modern life" for many U.K. citizens.

"I want to confront this challenge for our society and for all of us to take action to address the loneliness endured by the elderly, by [caregivers], by those who have lost loved ones – people who have no one to talk to or share their thoughts and experiences with," May stated when announcing the position in January.

While we often think of loneliness as being physically alone, loneliness is a state of mind. Loneliness can cause people to feel empty, disconnected, and isolated. Sometimes people feel lonely even when they are around others.

Loneliness is a common human emotion that is experienced differently for each person. A child who struggles to make friends at school has different needs for that loneliness than a recent widower who finds himself alone after 50 years of marriage. A college freshman may experience loneliness although he or she is thrown into a pool of peers and roommates. A soldier coming home from a tour of duty might experience loneliness after the separation from other troops.

In the past few years, recent studies show that loneliness not only has an impact on our mental health, but on our physical health as well. Chronic loneliness increases anxiety, can raise blood pressure, and impair the immune system's ability to fight infections.

I would submit to you that there is a treatment for loneliness in the Body of Christ.

Naming God as the Holy Trinity is one way to express that Godself is formed in relationship. God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, is in fact, in substance, a relational being. God forms us to be like God (Genesis 1:26) and therefore we are each created as beings formed to be connected, in relationship, to one another, and to the one who breathes life into us.

Look for us at Canalside, Food Truck Tuesdays in Larkinville, in the public green spaces at the Medical Campus, on Slow Roll bike rides through Buffalo, in worship on Wednesdays in the summer, and each Sunday morning.

Get connected. Leave the loneliness behind. Experience the Power of Trinity!

Holy Trinity Continues to Support NRC Food Pantry

Each month the members who volunteer to serve at the pantry know their services are needed and appreciated. New volunteers eagerly accepted!!! See Donna Leiser for more information.

Transporting food donations from 1080 Main to 1275 Delaware each month is not a long trip but the back of the Leiser's car is always packed with anywhere from 20 to 30 bags of groceries and personal items. These donations add to the food that also comes from the Food Bank of WNY, other congregations and organizations. Organizing the variety of foods, checking expiration dates, stocking the shelves, and packing grocery bags with the basics of canned and boxed items are primary tasks. At the time of distribution, frozen meat, fish or fruit may be added to the bags. The upright freezer donated by our congregation about 2 years ago is very helpful in keeping foods at the proper temperature and accessible for ease of distribution.

The Pantry is only open on Tuesday from 10-2 and Wednesday from 2-4:30. Our World Hunger Team members provide their volunteer hours to Kelly Kowalski, the NRC "Food for All" coordinator. At times the teams are paired with other volunteers, Ex. Medical doctors who are Residents in some local hospitals are assigned to experience this type of community service and be aware of needs and how they may be met. It is always interesting to meet these people and learn their personal stories.

Exhibition Summary: The purpose of this exhibition is to highlight the artistic talents of members and friends of Holy Trinity Lutheran Church, and to give them the opportunity to sell their artwork if they wish to do so.

Guidelines: Each artist may submit up to three (3) works in the media of painting, drawing, photography and sculpture. Entries must be original works, not reproductions. There is no size limitation other than those dictated by our exhibit space. Two-dimensional artwork should be framed and ready to hang. Pedestals for three-dimensional works are available.

Insurance: Works will be insured by Holy Trinity from drop-off day to the designated pick-up day. Works left after closing time on pick-up day are left at the artist's own risk. All works will be handled in a professional manner; however, payment for lost or damaged works will be determined by our insurance carrier, whose decision is final. The maximum value that we can insure a single work for is \$2,000. Any amount over this is at the artist's own risk.

Entry fees, sales and commissions: There is no entry fee for this exhibition. Sales will be handled by Holy Trinity and the artist will be reimbursed minus a 10% donation to the church.

Entry procedure: Artists wishing to participate should complete the entry form and return it to the church office by May 6. Then deliver the artwork to Holy Trinity on May 11, 12 or 13. (See calendar below.)

Opening Reception: We request that all artists attend the opening reception on May 19 from 6 pm to 9 pm. Please invite your family and friends to the reception also.



Happy Springtime to you all!!! The wonderful music of Easter Sunday (thank you Kristen, Justin, choir and musicians) is still fresh in my memory and so is the Easter message: Jesus lives! Now! In you and in me! Alleluja!!

I have been reviewing 'Stewards of God's Love', a pamphlet published by the ELCA with refreshing and innovative thoughts about stewardship. It was inspiring to learn how the Holy Spirit has worked in other congregations and what can be accomplished when a community of like-minded people work together! Starting with this newsletter, I will be sharing some of the concepts that were introduced.

The following is taken directly from the pamphlet:

'Stewardship encompasses so much more than money. It is a way of life. It calls for integration between our faith and the way that we live our lives — we are a church that is energized by lively engagement in our faith and life. Stewardship is a mindset, a culture and a discipline that can never be contained in an annual three-week financial response. According to Clarence Stoughton, former president of Wittenberg University, stewardship is everything we do after we say "I believe". It is the way in which we use all of the resources that God has entrusted to our care so that we can love God and our neighbor. Stewardship is about love.

Kathy Fiscus, Faith and Finances Ministry Team Chair, Central Lutheran Church, Minneapolis summed up stewardship this way:

"Stewardship is a matter of the heart. My stewardship practices are a response to the boundless love God first showed me. It means that I am grateful for all that God has generously entrusted to me. As a faithful steward and child of God, I understand that (the) decisions I make, in all aspects of my life, reveal my priorities. It is a privilege to share time, talents and finances, to care for God's earth and to serve my neighbors. Being a good steward has brought me great joy and has helped me grow spiritually. I am blessed to be a blessing."

A Good Night's Sleep

Getting a good night's sleep helps you stay healthy and alert. But many older people don't sleep well. If you're always sleepy, it may be time to see a doctor. You should not wake up every day feeling tired.

Older adults need about the same amount of sleep as young adults - 7 to 9 hours each night. But seniors tend to go to sleep earlier and get up earlier than when they were younger. Older people may nap more during the day, which can sometimes make it hard to fall asleep at night.

There are two kinds of sleep REM (rapid eye movement) sleep and non-REM sleep. We dream mostly during REM sleep. As people get older; they spend less time in deep sleep, which may be why older people are often light sleepers.

There are many reasons why older people may not get enough sleep at night. Feeling sick or being in pain can make it hard to sleep. Some of the medicines older people take can keep you awake. No matter the reason, if you don't get a good night's sleep, the next day you may be:1) irritable; 2) have memory problems or be forgetful; 3) feel depressed; 4) have more falls or accidents; 5) feel very sleepy during the day.

Insomnia is the most common sleep problem in adults age 60 and older: People with insomnia have trouble falling asleep. Insomnia can last for days, months or even years. If you are having trouble sleeping. you may: 1) take a long time to fall asleep; 2) wake up many times in the night; 3) wake up early and be unable to get back to sleep; 4) wake up tired; 5) feel very sleepy during the day.

There are many causes of insomnia. Some of them you can control, but others you can't. For example, if you are excited about a new activity or worrying over bills, you may have trouble sleeping. Sometimes insomnia can be a sign of other problems. Or it could be a side effect of a medication or an illness.

Often being unable to fall asleep becomes a habit. Some people worry about not being able to sleep even before they go to bed. This may even make insomnia worse.

Older adults who have trouble sleeping may use more over the counter sleep aids. Using prescription medicines for a short time might help. But remember, medicines are not a cure for insomnia. Developing healthy habits at bedtime may help you get a good night's sleep. It is said having a TV in the bedroom, may not be a good idea. Watching TV in the bedroom does not seem to help you get a good night's sleep. It can stimulate you. You can get excited about the program you are watching and then cannot fall asleep. Reading before sleep does seem to quiet one down and helps one fall asleep easier.

Sleep Apnea is another serious sleep disorder. A person with sleep apnea has short pauses in breathing while sleeping. These pauses may happen many times during the night. If not treated, sleep apnea can lead to other problems such as high blood pressure, stroke, or memory loss.

A Good Night's Sleep Cont.

You can have sleep apnea and not even know it. Loud snoring and gasping for air can keep other people awake. This happened to me with my late husband. I went to the doctor with him and told him I think my husband has sleep apnea. The doctor asked me why I think he has sleep apnea. I said I was a nurse and I sleep with him. He snored so loud and kept gasping for air at times. He did not say another word but ordered the sleep apnea test. And yes, he did have sleep apnea. He was given the sleep apnea breathing machine. This machine is called the Continuous Positive Air Pressure (CPAP). I loved the hum of the machine and I went right to sleep and no more snoring!!! If you think you have sleep apnea, see a doctor who knows about this sleep problem. There are MD's who specialize in sleep disorders.

It is important if you do have sleep problems that you see a doctor. There are other reasons that can cause insomnia and only a doctor can diagnose your problem. Information for this article was taken from the National Institute on Aging.
