Paul writes: ^{4b}If anyone else has reason to be confident in the flesh, I have more: ⁵circumcised on the eighth day, a member of the people of Israel, of the tribe of Benjamin, a Hebrew born of Hebrews; as to the law, a Pharisee; ⁶as to zeal, a persecutor of the church; as to righteousness under the law, blameless.


⁷Yet whatever gains I had, these I have come to regard as loss because of Christ. ⁸More than that, I regard everything as loss because of the surpassing value of knowing Christ Jesus my Lord.

For his sake I have suffered the loss of all things, and I regard them as rubbish, in order that I may gain Christ ⁹and be found in him, not having a righteousness of my own that comes from the law, but one that comes through faith in Christ, the righteousness from God based on faith. ¹⁰I want to know Christ and the power of his resurrection and the sharing of his sufferings by becoming like him in his death, ¹¹if somehow I may attain the resurrection from the dead.

¹²Not that I have already obtained this or have already reached the goal; but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. ¹³Beloved, I do not consider that I have made it my own; but this one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, ¹⁴I press on toward the goal for the prize of the heavenly call of God in Christ Jesus.

we praise you, O God, blessed and holy Trinity,



MUSIC NOTES

James Bigham, Organist/Choirmaster, Holy Trinity Lutheran Church

A native of South Carolina, James Bigham holds an undergraduate degree in English from Erskine College and the Artists' Diploma from the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia, where he was a student of Alexander McCurdy. Previously he had studied organ with Frederick Swann. Mr. Bigham received the M.S.M. degree from the School of Sacred Music of Union Theological Seminary in New York City, where his major teacher was Robert Baker. He then spent a year abroad studying with George Thalben-Ball of the Temple Church in London and with Michael Schneider in Cologne. He continued his studies with McNeil Robinson in New York City throughout his career. Mr. Bigham's piano study was with Dr. David Phillips of the University of South Carolina.

Organist-Choirmaster at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in Buffalo from 1977-2017, James Bigham has been acclaimed for his performances as organ soloist with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra in its concerts at Holy Trinity Church under Peter Perrett, Semyon Bychkov, Jorge Mester, Clark Suttle, Julius Rudel, Raymond Harvey and many other conductors. He has played concertos also with the San Jose and Charleston Symphonies, has performed recitals and conducted workshops in many parts of the country, and has recorded two CD's for Gothic Records.

Shortly after arriving in Buffalo, Mr. Bigham was instrumental in reestablishing the parish's well-known concert series. Since then many area premiers and notable performances have occurred in collaborations between the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra and the Concert Choir of Holy Trinity Church; most notably the Vaughan Williams *Sanctum Civitas*, the Lloyd Webber *Requiem*, a fully staged Mendelssohn *Elijah*, the Berlioz *Messe Solennelle*, the complete Bach *Christmas Oratorio*, the Mahler 8th Symphony etc. etc. During Mr. Bigham's tenure, the Margaret L. Wendt Foundation gave a world class double organ of 155 ranks with a five manual (main) console. In addition, a highly innovative chapel organ was added, as well as a superb Steinway concert grand for the nave. Mr. Bigham retired in 2017 after overseeing the complete chancel organ rebuild and installation of the Margaret L. Wendt Memorial Organ by the Parsons Pipe Organ Builders of Canandaigua, NY.

David Higgs, Chair, Eastman School of Music Organ Department

American organist David Higgs serves as the chair of the organ department at the Eastman School of Music. Professor Higgs earned his B.M. and M.M. at the Manhattan School of Music in New York City, with a Performer's Certificate following from Eastman. He was on the faculty at Manhattan from 1983-1986 and was Associate Organist of Riverside Church in New York, where he also conducted the Riverside Choral Society. He then moved to the San Francisco area to join the faculty of the Church Divinity School of the Pacific. In 1992, Mr. Higgs moved to Rochester, NY, where he joined the faculty at Eastman. He is now the chair of the Organ and Historical Keyboards Department, and continues to serve as a professor of organ while maintaining an active international performance schedule. His students have won prizes in prestigious international competitions, and hold important positions in leading academic and religious institutions. Mr. Higgs has recorded for Delos International, Pro Organo, Arsis, Loft, and Gothic records.

It was a blustery morning on Sunday, January 19th, 2003. Not accustomed to driving in blizzard-like conditions, I was asked if I could drive the "Fredonia crew" up to Buffalo for Sunday rehearsal and service. I really didn't know much about Holy Trinity Church, though many of my friends over the years had sung there. And as I subsequently became more aware of the bigger picture, many of the influential people - high school teachers, college professors, colleagues - those who were shaping my life - also had sung there. And - there were always these background stories that all seemed too large to be real. Tales of grand concerts, big services, parades around the church, even bigger parties in some secret Summer Street garden... I quickly agreed to drive - I just had to see all of this for myself, and thus I attended my first Service at Holy Trinity.

You might recall the old 1980 and 1990's ads from "tape" manufacturer Memorex. There's the proverbial guy sitting cross legged in an easy chair with a lamp beside him, looking dead ahead at his hi-fidelity sound system, his hair flying straight backwards, the lamp shade about to become unhinged from its mount, as if the wind coming from the stereo was blowing 35 knots. The hook - "Is it real or is it Memorex?"

That was my epiphany experience. After Service, dumbfounded I went humbly to meet the legend behind the organ. With his gentle handshake, the 747-like console behind him, I was greeted with something like, "Oh Chaaaald (with no apparent diphthong), welcome to the Main Street Opera House. Did you enjoy the Service?"

Well - if you haven't yet accepted you ought to profess yourself a repentant sinner, by the time the *chamade*'s finished their triumphant fanfare, one - out of fear alone, might beg forgiveness before the great high priest himself might come straight through the chancel windows to take you home.

"Glad to hear chaaaald. I reckon the mayo' could hear the Service down at City Hall."

I tell this silly anecdote as my Jimmy story is everyone's Jimmy story. Whether you were an avocational singer, a paid "lead singer," a member of concert choir, a member of the congregation, or just a guest in the Church - we were all elevated to a new place through Jimmy's incredible vision, artistry, complexity of orchestration, and excruciating detail. When you attended a Service at Holy Trinity in Buffalo, New York, you also attended a Service at the Riverside Church, at St. Thomas Fifth Avenue, attended a performance at the Metropolitan Opera, and took classes at the Curtis Institute all rolled into one hour-and-fifteen minute Service. Well - maybe - more like an hour-and-a-half. But who needs to worry about time when the likes of Fred Swann, Robert Baker, and McNeil Robinson seemingly sat on the bench with him.

Where it all came from, one can hardly imagine. As I would turn pages for Jimmy's pre-service each week - Handel Concertos, any of the Schübler 18-great Bach Chorales - insert "virtuosic organ repertoire," Jimmy would be carrying on a full dialogue while I was trying not to miss a note. "Chaaald, can you believe all those people left the house last night at 4:30 in the mornin'? I mean for - real! Brian was still washin' dishes when I got up at 5:30 to go to Church!"

Wait - what are you talking about??? Darn it - I missed the page turn!

Jimmy's influence goes far beyond the grey stone walls of 1080 Main. The laughs, the tears, the concerts, the services, even the parties - we are all better people because of what he gave us - himself, his passion, his desire to bring us closer to whatever God is, for each of us. No one could ever say it better than Jimmy's partner, Brian - no matter if things went well or things didn't go as planned, "Jimmy always made music."

That is the legacy we celebrate today, to be forever marked by the engraving on our heroic Margaret L. Wendt Memorial Organ - the instrument we have because of Jimmy. May all who play or sing in this place be reminded of the incredible legacy that was given to each of us, in this most special and sacred place.
