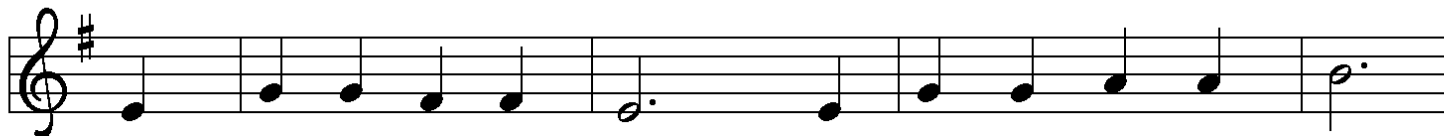

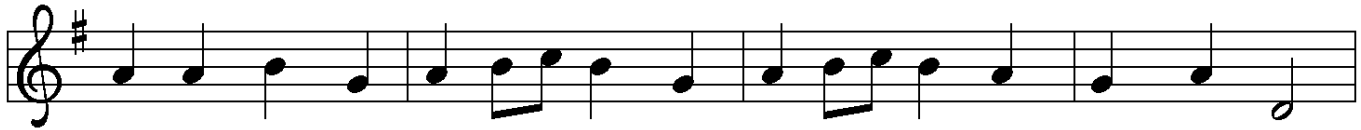

The second reading for today is recorded in Hebrews, the 12th Chapter.

¹⁸You have not come to something that can be touched, a blazing fire, and darkness, and gloom, and a tempest, ¹⁹and the sound of a trumpet, and a voice whose words made the hearers beg that not another word be spoken to them. ²⁰(For they could not endure the order that was given, "If even an animal touches the mountain, it shall be stoned to death.") ²¹Indeed, so terrifying was the sight that Moses said, "I tremble with fear.") ²²But you have come to Mount Zion and to the city of the living God, the heavenly Jerusalem, and to innumerable angels in festal gathering, ²³and to the assembly of the firstborn who are enrolled in heaven, and to God the judge of all, and to the spirits of the righteous made perfect, ²⁴and to Jesus, the mediator of a new covenant, and to the sprinkled blood that speaks a better word than the blood of Abel.

²⁵See that you do not refuse the one who is speaking; for if they did not escape when they refused the one who warned them on earth, how much less will we escape if we reject the one who warns from heaven! ²⁶At that time his voice shook the earth; but now he has promised, “Yet once more I will shake not only the earth but also the heaven.” ²⁷This phrase, “Yet once more,” indicates the removal of what is shaken—that is, created things—so that what cannot be shaken may remain. ²⁸Therefore, since we are receiving a kingdom that cannot be shaken, let us give thanks, by which we offer to God an acceptable worship with reverence and awe; ²⁹for indeed our God is a consuming fire.

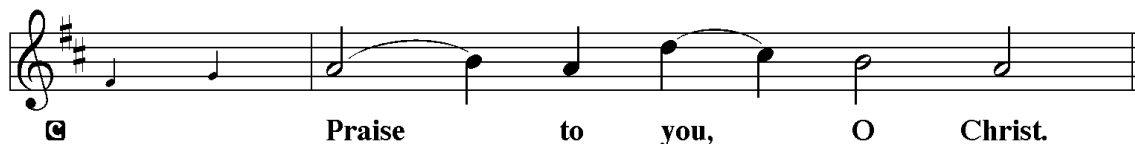

Music Notes

Herbert Norman Howells (1892 – 1983) was an English composer, organist, and teacher, most famous for his large output of Anglican church music. Howells was born in Lydney, Gloucestershire, the youngest of the six children. His father played the organ at the local Baptist church, and Herbert himself showed early musical promise, first filling in for his father, and by age 11 at the local Church of England as choirboy and unofficial organist.

The 1910 premiere of Ralph Vaughan Williams' *Fantasia on a Theme of Thomas Tallis* was a formative experience for the young Howells. Both Vaughan Williams and the earlier Tudor-era Renaissance composers (including Tallis) profoundly influenced Howells' later work. In 1912, Howells moved to London and was awarded a scholarship to study at the Royal College of Music, where his teachers included Charles Villiers Stanford, Hubert Hastings Parry and Charles Wood. Unlike Vaughan Williams however, Howells never collected or made direct use of English folk song in his composition. He did, however, accept their importance as part of a wider musical heritage but preferred to allow church modes and the pentatonic scale to play a more prominent part in the construction of his music. He eventually became organist at Salisbury Cathedral, but was forced to resign in 1917 for health reasons. From 1917-1980, he became a teacher at the Royal Conservatory of Music.

Howells' *Hymnus Paradisi* is often considered his masterpiece. It was written in 1938 as a Requiem to his son who died suddenly from polio at the age of nine. Howells' output continued to focus on sacred themes well into the 1940's, with a series of Mass settings and Canticles.

Herbert Howells died in London at the age of 90. Howells was not considered famous after his early years, but after his death his works were rediscovered for their depth and range. His academic awards included an honorary doctorate from the University of Cambridge, a "Herbert Howells Society", started by his daughter, and a "Herbert Howells Trust" which exists to promote his works.
