#### Celebrations and Sacrifices

Reading the Bible in a Year (see the reading plan in this edition of your Church Paper) has been an enlightening experience for me. I rarely have the opportunity to read the scripture for me, or at least without planning a sermon around the text, so it's fun to read the passages without the pressure of proclamation. We have read over the last two months Genesis, Job, and Exodus and now we are moving through Leviticus and into Numbers.

In reading Exodus, I'm struck by how the "people" of Israel are being formed; from a migrant family, to a people oppressed and enslaved, to a new generation of "Israelites" to whom God has now promised, "You will be my people" (Exodus 6:7).

How are these people formed into a nation? How does God bind them to each other and to God's own self?

Celebrations and Sacrifices. A theme I have seen is that the people are being formed together through the Celebrations God has encouraged, and the Sacrifices which have become a part of their life in community.

We too are a community marked by Celebration and Sacrifice, and from October to December it is fully evident in the life of the church.

"This is the Feast of Victory for our Lord, Alleluia, Alleluia, Alleluia!" Evangelical Lutheran Worship p.140

We mark every Sunday as a Feast Day for the Lord, singing praises to God in the tradition of the whole church. The ancient Israelites were taught in the desert season of their lives to celebrate. To remember that they had been captive in Egypt and God had brought them out of bondage into freedom. We too celebrate each Sunday that God has created us, redeemed us, and forgives us, re-forming us to be God's people in the world. We celebrate that it is God who makes us free, who calls each one of us, "worthy," and who in Baptism claims us as God's very own. And so we celebrate!

Ancient Israelites were taught to celebrate each Sabbath day, as we do, and additional Celebration Days including Passover, the New Year (Rosh Ha-Shanah), and harvest festivals like Shavuot, the festival of first fruits, and Sukkot, in-gathering of the harvest.



#### Celebrations and Sacrifices cont.

We are entering our season of Celebration – from Reformation to the commemoration of All Saints to the high celebration of the Nativity of our Lord – with lots of smaller celebrations in between including a Potluck Feast on Commitment (Consecration) Sunday, Thanksgiving, Lessons & Carols, The Christmas Pageant & Dinner, and so many more along the way!

These celebrations form us by gathering us together, creating in us common experiences and memories, and giving us opportunities to laugh and love.

Along with the Celebrations, I see God's people being formed together by their sacrifice. From Exodus to Deuteronomy there are a comparable list of sacrifices which accompany the celebrations. Individual sacrifice to atone for one's sins, corporate sacrifice to make atonement for the whole community, each with their own liturgies, signs, and practices.

We too are formed together through sacrifice. That as followers of Jesus and children of God we are invited, called, and commissioned to live our lives for the sake of others – this is sacrifice! We sacrifice for the sake of our family, our community, our country, and for the sake of the world. Our sacrifices include the tithes and offerings that we share through the church, but also gifts of time and abilities. We need not participate in sacrifices begrudgingly, but we can do so lovingly. Remembering that God has set us free, that God calls us beloved, that God bestows on us all our gifts, we are set free to sacrifice for the sake of others, and in them, we are formed into the body of Christ, which itself is in the shape of sacrifice – a cross.

So, God's people at Holy Trinity, I look forward to walking these Holy Days of Celebration and Sacrifice with you; trusting that God is at work in us, forming us, binding us together, bringing healing and wholeness to our community and the world around us.

#### Season of Gratitude

Over the past few months you may have journeyed with me through a time of discernment. And like me, perhaps that time has been fruitful and you have found some answers and direction to what you were discerning. I know that I did, and now as we move further into Fall and closer to Thanksgiving, Advent and Christmas, I find myself entering into a time of thoughtful gratitude.

According to Merriam-Webster, gratitude is defined as "the state of being grateful: thankfulness." To me this definition doesn't seem to convey exactly what the word gratitude is trying to express, so I looked up what it meant to be grateful and according to Merriam-Webster to be grateful is to be "appreciative of benefits received." This is probably the best definition I am going to be able to find that conveys what gratitude is. For me, gratitude is not something that we do necessarily because it is appropriate or because social cues dictate that it is appropriate etiquette, but something that we are compelled to do as we receive blessings through the kindness and thoughtfulness of others.

A few weeks ago, we heard two different lessons on gratitude; the first was from Luke 17 and it was the story of the Cleansing of the Ten Lepers, the second was read as part of the Narrative Lectionary, which we use as part of our Wednesday Evening Service, and we read from Psalm 150. Both of these texts talk about the benefits people received from God and the response that was given in appreciation of these gifts. Luke tells the story of the Lepers being healed and only one returning to give thanks to Jesus, Jesus then blesses him again saying that, "your faith has made you well." Psalm 150 is categorized as a "Hymn of Praise." Walter Brueggemann writes, "[Hymns of praise] characterizes a public (as distinct from personal or intimate) song that is sung with abandonment in praise to God for the character of God's person or the nature of God's creating and liberating actions."

In that, the concept of "I get to vs. I have to" was introduced. It is a way to change perspective, to reorient ourselves into a mindset of gratitude; and it works a little like this...we all have those things in our lives where it feels like a chore to do them, such as dishes, cleaning, laundry, filling up the gas in our cars, mowing and weeding our yards, whatever it may be. And we know that there are people living in and among us that don't have these luxuries (yes, I said it luxuries). There are people living among us that don't have homes to clean, dishes to do, laundry to wash. So the next time you dread completing a chore and you hear yourself saying "I have to mow the grass" or "I have to do laundry" I challenge you to say instead "I get to mow the grass" and "I get to wash clothes." We have been blessed by God to have these things and there are those in the world who are praying to have these things. Gratitude is our thankfulness for our blessings, for the creating and liberating ways in which God works. Let's celebrate, may the Spirit move and compel us to rejoice and dance and sing, may we be overwhelmed with gratefulness that hymns of praise flow from our lips.






#### Friends in High Places

The ELCA has a connection to the global Lutheran church through the Lutheran World Federation (LWF). The ELCA maintains an office at the UN headquarters in New York City to help support the church's outreach on global social issues. It's called the Lutheran Office for World Community, formed in 1973. The director and his assistant attend the UN General Assembly and the Security Council meetings to convey the social policy views of the ELCA and the LWF to the UN, including human rights, justice, respect for internatio

nal law, and better standards of living for all people. Recently global migration has been a major topic. One of the most gratifying projects has been working with the UN Commission on the Status of Women, which is dedicated to gender equality and the empowerment of women.

The Lutheran Office for World Community is rooted strongly in the ELCA's heart for humanity, focusing on regions where human rights have been violated. Its mission echoes the UN charter, which mentions respect for the dignity of the individual. "Each person is created in the image of God, regardless of their background or nationality. We all need to be given respect and dignity."

#### Forgetfulness: Knowing When to Ask for Help

#### Tips for Dealing with Forgetfulness

People with some forgetfulness can use a variety of techniques that may help them stay healthy and deal with changes in their thinking.

- Plan tasks, make "to do" lists, and use memory aids like notes and calendars. Some people find they remember things better if they mentally connect them to a familiar name, song, book, or TV show.
- Keep up interests or hobbies, and develop new ones, such as volunteering and visiting with family and friends.
- Engage in physical activity and exercise. Several studies have associated aerobic exercise (such as brisk walking) with better brain function, although more research is needed to say for sure whether exercise can help prevent or delay dementia. Exercise can also help relieve feelings of stress, anxiety, or depression.
- Eat healthy foods. A healthy diet can help reduce the risk of many chronic diseases and may also help keep your brain healthy.
- Limit alcohol use. Although some studies suggest that moderate alcohol use has health benefits, heavy or binge drinking over time can cause memory loss and permanent brain damage.

In vascular dementia, injuries to the vessels supplying blood to the brain lead to the death of brain tissue, often after a stroke or series of strokes. Symptoms of vascular dementia can vary but usually begin suddenly, depending on the location and severity of a stroke. The person's memory, language, reasoning, and coordination may be affected. Mood and personality changes are common as well. Some people have both Alzheimer's and vascular dementia, a condition known as mixed dementia.

#### Treatment for Dementia

A person with dementia should be under a doctor's care. The doctor might be a neurologist, family doctor, internist, geriatrician, or psychiatrist. He or she can help treat the patient's physical and behavioral problems (such as agitation or wandering) and answer the many questions that the person or family may have.

People with dementia caused by Alzheimer's disease may be treated with medications. Several medications are approved by the U.S. Food and Drug Administration to treat Alzheimer's. These drugs may, for some people, help slow down certain problems, such as memory loss, allowing them to remain independent for longer. They may also help with certain behavioral problems. However, none of these drugs can stop Alzheimer's disease from progressing. Many studies are investigating medications and other interventions to prevent or delay Alzheimer's disease and cognitive decline. People with vascular dementia should take steps to prevent further strokes. These steps include controlling high blood pressure, monitoring and treating high cholesterol and diabetes, and not smoking. Family members and friends can help people in the early stages of dementia continue their daily routines, physical activities, and social contacts. People with dementia should be kept up to date about the details of their lives, the time of day, where they live, and what is happening at home or in the world. Memory aids such as a big calendar, a list of daily plans, and notes may help.

#### What You Can Do

If you're concerned that you or someone you know has a serious memory problem, talk with your doctor. He or she may be able to diagnose the problem or refer you to a specialist, such as a neurologist or geriatric psychiatrist. Healthcare professionals who specialize in Alzheimer's and other dementias can recommend ways to manage the problem and suggest treatment and services that might help. Consider participating in clinical trials or studies. People with and without memory problems may be able to take part in clinical trials, which may help themselves or future generations.
