What Can't Wait

As this year winds down and we complete the 12 days of Christmas, I can't help but still be moved by the Advent series we did for Advent. A Sanctified Art, "What Can't Wait". The creators of What Can't Wait describe the theme as follows

Advent is a season of waiting, but is idle waiting what God wants of us? In preparation for the coming Messiah, we wonder together—what things can't wait? What demands our immediate attention? What requires our work and preparation? What is it that God can't wait for? Is it our praise, reconciliation, and proclamation? Is it the end of suffering, isolation, and fear? This Advent, we invite you to join us in imaging, prioritizing, and preparing.



The weekly themes still followed the traditional Advent weekly themes of Hope, Peace, Joy and Love, but A Sanctified Art put a twist on these themes and we heard about just what couldn't wait... God's Promised Day Can't Wait, Repentance Can't Wait, Delight Can't Wait and Courage Can't Wait. There was even a theme for Christmas Eve, What Can't Wait with the premise being that God Couldn't Wait.

As I reflect back on the following 4 weeks, the following few days, it feels as if this message of What Can't Wait will be just as relevant throughout the new year as it has the last 4 weeks leading up to the birth of Jesus.

The reflections throughout Advent pointed to a world where suffering and war were no more, where justice and reconciliation prevailed over oppression and marginalization. We could start to imagine what a world of grace and mercy could look like, culminating to the promise of a God who wouldn't, couldn't wait for these things to be in place before coming to earth in the form of a newborn baby.

After yet more violence; one at a Hanukkah celebration outside of New York City, the other during Eucharist at a Church of Christ congregation in Texas. The themes of love and mercy can't come soon enough and yet we are stuck in this season of hopeful anticipation that love and grace will win out, born from a baby in a manger.

Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton responds to the anti-Semitic incident by stating "This will require more of us than repeated statements. It will require building bridges of inter-religious understanding in our communities...In different ways, and for different reasons, this is a time of year when Jews and Christians celebrate the miracle of light. In our prayers and actions, may we be a living presence of God's sacred light that rouses us all to resistance and righteousness."

As heard time and time again, the Christmas story is a story of resistance. This new year, what can't wait? What practices, intentions and habits do you want to adopt in this next year? Where is God actively creating hope, peace, joy and love in your life?

From our Music Directors

We are so proud of the work the Chancel and Chapel Choirs shared with us this Advent and Christmas Season. Truly, the level of dedication and musical contribution our singers exhibit at Holy Trinity is second to none. On Christmas Eve, we were able to feature each of



our lead soloists and resident instrumentalists who all spent many outside hours prepping for rehearsal and services. We couldn't be more proud to work with these talented individuals week in and week out, for truly, they are the ones that have the talent and expertise to maintain the rigorous weekly musical schedule. Throughout the season, the Chancel Choir presented more than ten new works to their repertoire, all of which require a significant investment of time and energy to learn from scratch. Certainly, we hope that you enjoyed and were touched by their offerings.

Looking beyond the Christmas season, we have so much to look forward to.

March 6th: We welcome The Genevans, the touring student's choir from Geneva College of Pennsylvania. Conducted by Dr. David Kenneth Smith, The Genevans engage audiences while glorifying God and ministering with important spiritual truth. Founded in 1938, the choir continues a rich heritage of choral singing dating from the early years of the college over a century and a half ago. Over the course of their long history, The Genevans have acquired a reputation for choral excellence, musical variety and spiritual impact. We will be needing host families and helpers to assist in this special event.

March 29th: We welcome internationally acclaimed composer/conductor Jake Runestad to Holy Trinity as we present "Into the Light," a five movement cantata with chamber orchestra. The work uses texts that Mr. Runestad interpreted as extensions of Reformation ideology. Jake Runestad is an award-winning and frequently-performed composer of "highly imaginative" (Baltimore Sun) and "stirring and uplifting" (Miami Herald) musical works. Steeped in a belief that music has the power to initiate positive change, Jake creates musical works that are socially conscious and explore authentic human emotions and experiences. Considered a "choral rockstar" by American Public Media, Jake is one of the most frequently performed and commissioned composers of choral music in the world having "...a particular knack for marrying powerful music to texts that speak to some of the most pressing and moving issues of our time" (Star Tribune).

I wanted to share with the congregation that I have taken a leave from my teaching position at West Seneca East Middle School, where for the past twelve years I have served as the director of Instrumental Music to over 200 students making up three Concert Bands and two Jazz Ensembles. My leave began November 8th and I will return to West Seneca Central in September 2020.

The time away from public school teaching has afforded me the opportunity to work towards my musical objectives for Holy Trinity. The additional practice time has allowed me to study more regularly with Stephen Kennedy at the Eastman School of Music, and delve into the more substantial repertoire on my list. Additionally, I have had the opportunity to attend a number of masterclasses and seminars at Eastman on topics ranging from hymn playing and composition, organ accompanying skills, and choral repertoire.

Though this decision comes at a significant cost, this leave is also enabling me to plan and practice for Holy Trinity during daytime school hours and spend quality evening time with family, rather than negotiating the demands of both jobs which generally necessitate practicing late into the evening. Lillian is now nearly five years of age, and the time with her through these formative years is the most precious investment of all.

Today I want to share a story on how your offering [the part that is donated to the SYNOD every year] becomes mission support.

The following is taken from the "Stories of Faith in Action" publication from the ELCA:
Witness at the border

"Energy flows to a congregation when it's involved in an invaluable ministry among God's people. That's the case for *Iglesia Luterana Cristo Rey*, El Paso, Texas. Situated near the border with Juarez, Mexico, the congregation has found purpose in accompanying Latin American migrants and offering visitors border immersion experiences, said Rose Mary Sanchez-Guzman, its pastor.

Their Lutheran faith inspires their work. "[The migration crisis] is what I believe Christ is putting in front of us," she said. "This is urgent."

For two Tuesdays each month, *Cristo Rey* opens its doors to receive migrants. The congregations feeds them and provides them with overnight shelter and an opportunity to call their families so the can buy a bus or plane ticket to get to their court date on time. By Friday, most visitors are gone. In the interim period, the congregation works to educate its community about immigration issues and migrant rights. "Asylum seekers are legal in [this] country... they have the right to ask for asylum," Sanches-Guzman said. "They are legal until the court decides [otherwise] for them." Immersion program participants meet undocumented migrants, U.S. Border Patrol officers, immigration lawyers and others involved in border culture. Through the chain-link fence at the border, they listen as their Mexican neighbors share their joys and challenges.

"Spiritually, it has changed our congregation," she said, adding that although *Cristo* Rey is small and its members aren't wealthy, they've generously opened their hearts to their migrant neighbors. The congregation receives an annual grant, funded by Mission Support from the Rocky Mountain Synod and the churchwide organization, to bolster outreach.

Cristo Rey also finds support as a member of the ELCA Welcoming Congregations Network, an initiative of the ELCA's AMMPARO strategy (Accompanying Migrant Minors with Protection, Advocacy, Representation and Opportunities). There are 112 ELCA congregations involved.

"Jesus told us to help," said Sanches-Gyzman of *Cristo Rey*. "He didn't say just help people with documents. He just says feed the hungry and clothe the naked." *To find a video story about Cristo Rey, visit ELCA.org/SOFIA.*"

I hope it makes you feel good to know that your generosity has such an immense impact on our fellow brothers and sisters in need.

WINTER TIPS 2020

I decided to repeat my winter tips from last year. I know I need reminders every year, and I thought it would be good for all of you also.

Winter comes on us, it seems, faster every year. As a nurse, I have experienced many people falling and breaking hips, arms, legs etc. So below are the winter tips again. Please read them slowly and please put them into practice.

- 1. Before you go out the door, put on your gloves first. Many of us start to put them on as we are going out the door and start to walk. This is not a good habit because your mind is distracted and not paying attention to your steps. This can result in a fall.
- 2. Wear boots or winter shoes that have soles that are for winter snow. Many have little treads that are like your snow tires. They grip the snow and prevent sliding and falling.
- 3. Take small steps when walking on snow or ice. My husband use to say "Baby steps, Judy, Baby steps, Judy". He was right and I try to remember his words when walking in winter.
- 4. When getting out of your vehicle, look before you put your feet down and start to stand. "Black Ice" is a killer and you will find it more in plowed or shoveled driveways and parking lots. More falls are on black ice in winter.
- 5. Please always wear appropriate clothing, a warm jacket or coat,hat or gloves. If you are not warm, you may start to shiver and start to walk fast and again be distracted in your walking.

Always take care of your overall health, this may lower your chances of falling. Most of the time falls just do not happen, there is always an under lying reason. If you're older, ask your doctor for a mineral and bone density test. It will tell you if your bones are weak. If it shows your bones are weak, your doctor will advise you on steps to take.

Stay physically active. Plan an exercise program that is right for you. Regular exercise makes you stronger and improves muscles. It also helps keep your joints, tendons, and ligaments flexible. Mild weight bearing activities, such as walking or climbing stairs, may slow bone loss from osteoporosis

Have your eyes and hearing tested often. Even small changes in sight can put you at risk for falling. When you get new glasses, take time to get use to them. Always wear your glasses if you need them. If you have a hearing aid, be sure it fits right and wear it.

Find out about the side effects of any medicine you take. If a drug makes you sleepy or dizzy, tell your doctor.

Get enough sleep. If you are sleepy, you are more likely to fall. And if you do not feel well, stay home.

Winter Tips cont.

Limit the amount of alcohol you drink. Even a small amount can affect your balance. In winter, more people like to drink wine because of the warm feeling going down.

Lastly, as we get older, an emergency monitoring system is very important for one's safety. Get the one that can be used outside. If you go out shopping and are in a parking lot and fall, it can be a life saver.

I do hope these tips will help you stay safe this winter.
