Music Notes

Carson Cooman (b. 1982; Rochester, New York) is an American composer with a catalog of hundreds of works in many forms—from solo instrumental pieces to operas, and from orchestral works to hymn tunes. Since 2006, Cooman has held the position of Composer in Residence at The Memorial Church, Harvard University. From 2008-11, he also served as Composer in Residence to the Cathedral Church of St. Paul in Boston, Massachusetts. Since 2015, he has been Organ and Choral Editor for Lorenz Publishing Company and Sacred Music He has edited organ publications for various publishers (including Boosey & Hawkes and Oxford University Press) was editorial director for over 300 organ, choral. and publications for Zimbel Press. Cooman's principal composition teachers were Bernard Rands, Judith Weir, and he holds degrees from Harvard University and Carnegie Mellon University.

Cooman is an active organist who specializes in contemporary music. Over 300 new compositions by more than 100 international composers have been written for him. *Toccata, Aria, and Finale* (2017) was commissioned for the ongoing dedication events and recitals at St. Andrew's Catholic Church in Roanoke, Virginia.
