Music Notes

The setting of the Jewish prayer *Kaddisch* by Maurice Ravel (1875-1937) is one of the most beautiful of all time. The mourning songs Kaddish (from *Two Hebrew Melodies*) with their minimalist piano accompaniment, declamatory (often close to a recitativo) vocal style, and long melismas surging toward the work's climax indicate that there is no doubt that Ravel had listened to and studied Synagogue music and the vocal traditions of Hebrew cantors.

"Kaddish" is a hymn of praise about God found in Jewish prayer services. The central theme of the Kaddish is the magnification and sanctification of God's name. In the liturgy, different versions of the Kaddish are used functionally as separators between sections of the service.

The term "Kaddish" is often used to refer specifically to "The Mourner's Kaddish", said as part of the mourning rituals in Judaism in all prayer services, as well as at funerals and memorials; for eleven Hebrew months after the death of a parent, and for 30 days after the death of a spouse, sibling, or child. When mention is made of "saying Kaddish", this unambiguously refers to the rituals of mourning, illustrating that despite experiencing painful loss, God is still to be still praised.

Fredegond Cecily Shove (1889–1949) was an English poet who published two collections of poetry in her lifetime, and a small selection also appeared after her death. The poem in Shove's collection *The New Ghost* is a mystical description of a departing soul met by the Divine in a springtime, pastoral setting. It has an almost conversational rhythm. It was set to music by Ralph Vaughan Williams in 1925 as the third movement of his *Four Poems by Fredegond Shove*.
