Satisfy the thirsty, and give us the life only you can give.


(At home, dip your finger into a bowl or cup of water and make the sign of the cross on your forehead.)

¹⁶If I proclaim the gospel, this gives me no ground for boasting, for an obligation is laid on me, and woe to me if I do not proclaim the gospel! ¹⁷For if I do this of my own will, I have a reward; but if not of my own will, I am entrusted with a commission. ¹⁸What then is my reward? Just this: that in my proclamation I may make the gospel free of charge, so as not to make full use of my rights in the gospel.

¹⁹For though I am free with respect to all, I have made myself a slave to all, so that I might win more of them. ²⁰To the Jews I became as a Jew, in order to win Jews. To those under the law I became as one under the law (though I myself am not under the law) so that I might win those under the law. ²¹To those outside the law I became as one outside the law (though I am not free from God's law but am under Christ's law) so that I might win those outside the law. ²²To the weak I became weak, so that I might win the weak.

WIGGLY GRACE SPACE: This space, located to the left of the baptismal font, is intended especially for families with toddlers and preschoolers, recognizing that smaller kids are more engaged when they can see what is going on. Small tables and chairs, and ageappropriate soft toys help to keep our little ones occupied. The Wiggly Grace Space, as mentioned, is designed for toddlers/preschoolers (2-4 years of age) who are too old for nursery care (birth to 3 years) and not quite old enough for faith formation (Pre-K-12). This is a space that is more open than in the pew and just the right size for our littlest ones to move around and get their wiggles out! Here they can engage in age-appropriate activities while still experiencing worship in the sanctuary alongside their families and the whole community in Christ here at Holy Trinity. Parents/Guardians are encouraged to worship with their child(ren) when this space is being used. During COVID. the activities in the space will be limited and we ask that while in this space you continue to follow the HT COVID precautions (wear a mask, social distance, etc.).
