


¹Jesus went to the other side of the Sea of Galilee, also called the Sea of Tiberias. ²A large crowd kept following him, because they saw the signs that he was doing for the sick. ³Jesus went up the mountain and sat down there with his disciples. 4Now the Passover, the festival of the Jews, was near. 5When he looked up and saw a large crowd coming toward him, Jesus said to Philip, "Where are we to buy bread for these people to eat?" ⁶He said this to test him, for he himself knew what he was going to do. ⁷Philip answered him, "Six months' wages would not buy enough bread for each of them to get a little." 8One of his disciples, Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, said to him, 9"There is a boy here who has five barley loaves and two fish. But what are they among so many people?" 10 Jesus said, "Make the people sit down." Now there was a great deal of grass in the place; so they sat down, about five thousand in all. ¹¹Then Jesus took the loaves, and when he had given thanks, he distributed them to those who were seated; so also the fish, as much as they wanted.

¹²When they were satisfied, he told his disciples, "Gather up the fragments left over, so that nothing may be lost." ¹³So they gathered them up, and from the fragments of the five barley loaves, left by those who had eaten, they filled twelve baskets. ¹⁴When the people saw the sign that he had done, they began to say, "This is indeed the prophet who is to come into the world."

¹⁵When Jesus realized that they were about to come and take him by force to make him king, he withdrew again to the mountain by himself.

¹⁶When evening came, his disciples went down to the sea, ¹⁷got into a boat, and started across the sea to Capernaum. It was now dark, and Jesus had not yet come to them. ¹⁸The sea became rough because a strong wind was blowing. ¹⁹When they had rowed about three or four miles, they saw Jesus walking on the sea and coming near the boat, and they were terrified. ²⁰But he said to them, "It is I; do not be afraid." ²¹Then they wanted to take him into the boat, and immediately the boat reached the land toward which they were going. 





Music Notes

Ethel Smyth (b. 1858 London, England; d. 1944 Woking, England) Ethel Smyth was a twentieth-century British composer and a champion of women's rights and female musicians. During her lifetime, she composed symphonies, choral works (musical pieces

written for a choir), and operas including *The Wreckers*, 1906, and is most well known for *The March of Women*, an anthem for the women's suffrage movement. In 1922, she was named a Dame of the British Empire.

She studied Brahmsian musical composition and music theory at Leipzig Conservatory in Germany beginning in 1877; her sophisticated music elicited rave reviews. In 1889, she returned to London and developed talents in multiple areas of composition, culminating in an oeuvre that included orchestral pieces, choral arrangements, chamber music, and six operas. She earned acclaim for her performance of *Mass in D*, which was enthusiastically received in London in 1893. Despite this success and her immense talent, she struggled to find musicians to perform her works because she was a woman.

She ultimately gave up her music career due to her increased hearing loss. Smyth wrote about her life in several biographies, *Impressions that Remained*, 1919, and the memoir *Streaks of Life*, 1921, which captured her experiences in music, activism, and as an open lesbian, discussing her romantic involvements with famous women of her time, including Lady Pauline Trevelyan; the Empress Eugénie; heiress Winnaretta Singer; Lady Mary Ponsonby; writer Edith Somerville; and writer, Virginia Woolf. Smyth died in England in 1944 at the age of 86. She remains a highly regarded female composer and a strong musical and political voice of the early twentieth century.

About Hope Wilk, harp

Hope Wilk continues to be a fierce advocate for the expansion of harp repertoire. For over a decade, Hope has worked with composers to create new solo and chamber works for the harp, as well as transcribing her own arrangements of pieces from the classical music canon.

Hope holds degrees from The Royal Conservatory's Glenn Gould School and the New England Conservatory of Music. As a soloist, she has garnered acclaim for her performance of Alberto Ginastera's *Harp Concerto*, being titled first runner-up in concerto competitions with The Boston Pops and NEC Symphony. Most recently, Hope was a prize winner in the American Harp Society's National Competition: Young Professional Division.

She currently serves as Guest Harpist with the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra.
