

THE FIRST READING: Genesis 45:3-11, 15

The first reading for the Seventh Sunday after Epiphany is recorded in Genesis, the 45th Chapter.

³ Joseph said to his brothers, "I am Joseph. Is my father still alive?" But his brothers could not answer him, so dismayed were they at his presence.

⁴ Then Joseph said to his brothers, "Come closer to me." And they came closer. He said, "I am your brother, Joseph, whom you sold into Egypt. ⁵ And now do not be distressed or angry with yourselves because you sold me here, for God sent me before you to preserve life. ⁶ For the famine has been in the land these two years, and there are five more years in which there will be neither plowing nor harvest. ⁷ God sent me before you to preserve for you a remnant on earth and to keep alive for you many survivors. ⁸ So it was not you who sent me here but God; he has made me a father to Pharaoh and lord of all his house and ruler over all the land of Egypt. ⁹ Hurry and go up to my father and say to him, 'Thus says your son Joseph, God has made me lord of all Egypt; come down to me; do not delay.

¹⁰ You shall settle in the land of Goshen, and you shall be near me, you and your children and your children's children, as well as your flocks, your herds, and all that you have. ¹¹ I will provide for you there, since there are five more years of famine to come, so that you and your household and all that you have will not come to poverty.' " ¹⁵ And he kissed all his brothers and wept upon them, and after that his brothers talked with him.

SECOND READING: 1 Corinthians 15:35-38, 42-50

The second reading for today is recorded in 1st Corinthians, the 15th Chapter.

⁵But someone will ask, "How are the dead raised? With what kind of body do they come?" ³⁶Fool! What you sow does not come to life unless it dies. ³⁷ And as for what you sow, you do not sow the body that is to be but a bare seed, perhaps of wheat or of some other grain. ³⁸ But God gives it a body as he has chosen and to each kind of seed its own body.

⁴² So it is with the resurrection of the dead. What is sown is perishable; what is raised is imperishable. ⁴³ It is sown in dishonor; it is raised in glory. It is sown in weakness; it is raised in power. ⁴⁴ It is sown a physical body; it is raised a spiritual body. If there is a physical body, there is also a spiritual body. ⁴⁵ Thus it is written, "The first man, Adam, became a living being"; the last Adam became a life-giving spirit. ⁴⁶ But it is not the spiritual that is first but the physical and then the spiritual. ⁴⁷ The first man was from the earth, made of dust; the second man is from heaven. ⁴⁸ As one of dust, so are those who are of the dust, and as one of heaven, so are those who are of heaven. ⁴⁹ Just as we have borne the image of the one of dust, we will also bear the image of the one of heaven.

⁵⁰ What I am saying, brothers and sisters, is this: flesh and blood cannot inherit the kingdom of God, nor does the perishable inherit the imperishable.



Your reward will be great, and you will be children of the Most High, for he himself is kind to the ungrateful and the wicked. ³⁶ Be merciful, just as your Father is merciful.

³⁷ "Do not judge, and you will not be judged; do not condemn, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven; ³⁸ give, and it will be given to you. A good measure, pressed down, shaken together, running over, will be put into your lap, for the measure you give will be the measure you get back."





Music Notes

This February, Holy Trinity will highlight African American composers in honor of black history month.

The organ prelude is a whimsical piece by Florence Price called *Retrospection* (also known as *Elf on a Moonbeam*.) Florence Beatrice Price (1887-1953) was an American classical composer, pianist, organist and music teacher. Born in Little Rock, Arkansas, Price was educated at the New England Conservatory of Music, and was active in Chicago from 1927 until her death in 1953. Price is noted as the first African-American woman to be recognized as a symphonic composer, and the first to have a composition played by a major orchestra.

Vox Lusciniae, our guest choir in-residence this weekend, is a newly-formed treble choir based in Buffalo, NY and directed by Dr. Brian M. Stevens. Their mission is to support contemporary and innovative music for treble voices. "Vox Lusciniae" means voice of the nightingale. A nightingale has among the widest variety of vocalizations. They can combine different sounds to form unique melodies, often unique to each individual bird. Nightingales symbolize renewal, creation, and the coming of spring.

Vox Lusciniae sings two pieces based on spirituals. First, a setting of *Steal Away* by English composer Malcolm Archer. The song was composed by Wallace Willis and his daughter Minerva Willis, slaves of a Choctaw, freedman in the old Indian Territory, sometime before 1862. *I Hear Music in the Air* by Carl MaultsBy is based on the spirituals *I Will Trust in the Lord* and *Up Above My Head*. Carl Maultsby (b. 1949) is an African-American composer, arranger, conductor, organist, keyboardist, singer, and author. Carl MaultsBy is a diverse composer working in musical theatre, film, television, records, and cultural media.

The organ postlude is Adolphus Hailstork's toccata on the African-American spiritual *Great Day.* Hailstork's use of lively and driving rhythms capture the spirited optimism of this spiritual. Adolphus Hailstork (b. 1941) received his doctorate in composition from Michigan State University, where he was a student of H. Owen Reed. Dr. Hailstork has written across a variety of genres, producing works for chorus, solo voice, solo piano, organ, various chamber ensembles, band, and orchestra. Dr. Hailstork has received honorary doctorates from the Manhattan School of Music, Michigan State University, and the College of William and Mary. He resides in Virginia Beach, Virginia, where he is professor emeritus at Old Dominion University.


We are thrilled to announce Vox Lusciniae's concert today at 2:30pm!




