THE FIRST READING: Deuteronomy 26:1-11

The first reading for the First Sunday in Lent is recorded in Deuteronomy, the 26th Chapter.

¹ "When you have come into the land that the Lord your God is giving you as an inheritance to possess and you possess it and settle in it, ² you shall take some of the first of all the fruit of the ground, which you harvest from the land that the LORD your God is giving you, and you shall put it in a basket and go to the place that the LORD your God will choose as a dwelling for his name. ³ You shall go to the priest who is in office at that time and say to him, 'Today I declare to the LORD your God that I have come into the land that the LORD swore to our ancestors to give us.' 4 When the priest takes the basket from your hand and sets it down before the altar of the LORD your God, 5 you shall make this response before the LORD your God: 'A wandering Aramean was my ancestor; he went down into Egypt and lived there as an alien, few in number, and there he became a great nation, mighty and populous. ⁶ When the Egyptians treated us harshly and afflicted us, by imposing hard labor on us, 7 we cried to the LORD, the God of our ancestors; the Lord heard our voice and saw our affliction, our toil, and our oppression. 8 The LORD brought us out of Egypt with a mighty hand and an outstretched arm, with a terrifying display of power, and with signs and wonders; 9 and he brought us into this place and gave us this land, a land flowing with milk and honey. ¹⁰ So now I bring the first of the fruit of the ground that you, O LORD, have given me.' You shall set it down before the LORD your God and bow down before the LORD your God. 11 Then you, together with the Levites and the aliens who reside among you, shall celebrate with all the bounty that the LORD your God has given to you and to your house."

in your mouth and in your heart"



MUSIC NOTES

American Guild of Organists - Women Composer Sunday

The service begins with **Brenda Portman**'s (b. 1980) *Elegy* which won the Twin Cities AGO Composition Competition in 2016. Following a decade of successes in performance competitions, and now with her compositions increasingly in demand, Brenda Portman has established a well-respected dual career as both a concert organist and composer. She serves as the Resident Organist at Hyde Park Community United Methodist Church in Cincinnati, Ohio, where she is also the Executive Director of the church's renowned Organ Concert Series. She is the Organ Instructor at Xavier University in Cincinnati, and also teaches organ and piano privately.

Holy Trinity choirs love singing the music of **Gwyneth Walker** (b. 1947). On Ash Wednesday we heard her setting of *Steal Away*. This morning, Michael Teti, *tenor* makes his Holy Trinity solo debut singing *This is My Prayer* from *Tagore: Songs of Heaven and Sky*. Walker was born in New York to a Quaker family and grew up in New Canaan, Connecticut. She began her first efforts at composition at an early age and went on to receive BA, MM and DMA degrees in Music Composition from Brown University and the Hartt School of Music. She taught music for fourteen years at Hartt School of Music, the Hartford Conservatory and the Oberlin College Conservatory, and then moved to a dairy farm in Vermont and went to work as a full-time composer. In 1988, she helped found the Consortium of Vermont Composers and later became the director of the organization.

The Chancel Choir sings the Robert Shaw and Alice Parker (1925-2023) setting of *Go Down, Moses*. A master of American choral music, Parker wrote arrangements of hymns, folk songs and spirituals used in concert halls and churches countrywide. For two decades she also worked with the most prominent American chorus of her day, the Robert Shaw Chorale, collaborating with Mr. Shaw on hundreds of works. "She wasn't about professional choirs," he added. "She was focused on getting everybody singing. She would go into the church for an hour or two, and have people singing hymns." For Ms. Parker, singing served a deeper purpose than simply providing pleasure. In a 2022

interview with Newmusic USA, Ms. Parker said:

"When we sing something perfectly lovely together, not necessarily the B minor Mass or something that needs a lot of rehearsal, but a hymn, or a folk song, or a children's song, we sing it together, and it really clicks, and you have this marvelous feeling of brotherhood in the room."



The performance will be Friday, March 21st at 7:30 pm, at Westminster P.C., 724 Delaware Avenue.






